Minutes--Chapter Meeting February 9, 2018

The Gamma Sigma chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma convened at 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, February 9, 2019, at Southern Middle School. Thirteen members of Gamma Sigma and two visitors were in attendance.

After the call to order, attendees observed a moment of silence. Marcy Cooper, principal for Southern Middle School, provided the program about the school's "Capturing Kids Hearts" initiative. Created by Flip Flippen of the Flippen Group, the program is based on the EXCEL Model:

E = Engage with greetings and good things

X = X-plore by identifying the needs of the group via a social contract

C = Communicate by evaluating individual and group adherence with social contract

E = Empower by defining roles and responsibilities

L = Launch by ending with reflections and affirmations

Those in attendance unanimously approved the minutes from the December meeting which were published in the newsletter. The group also unanimously approved the treasurer's report, provided by Becky Oldham and pasted below.

Corresponding Secretary Robyn Lam had no separate report.

Tricia Cox outlined a number of volunteer opportunities around literacy, including Literacy Council programs at Southern Pines Primary and Elementary Schools. *Growing Moore Readers* has applied for a Duke grant to assist with literacy in the northern part of the county. Robyn Lam described a successful program at her granddaughter's school that used a racing theme to bring awareness and resources.

Wanda Sweeney reported that this year's scholarship will be provided to a Union Pines High School student. Typically, the scholarship funding comes from December Bazaar funds. While the bazaar did not yield the \$1,000 needed, the chapter is committed to adhering with that amount for the scholarship.

The Delta Rho chapter raised their dues to include the cost for the December Bazaar meal. Gamma Sigma will vote on that idea in April. Discussion continued about the date for the bazaar. The by-laws indicate that it will be held the first Saturday in December, but conflict

with the meeting site pushed it to the second Saturday last December. President Betty is working with Libby Carter on other venue options.

Members passed the brag basket for literacy, and all agreed to split the proceeds with World Fellowship. There was a request for the membership list to be included in the next newsletter. There also was the request for the corresponding secretary to distribute dates of the three high school musicals via e-mail, along with similar dates for Methodist University where member Tricia Cox's daughter is involved in music and theatre.

The next meeting is scheduled for April 9, 2019, in the (CTE Room at Pinecrest High School) at the Ed. Center at Pinckney at 5:30 p.m. Members with last names that begin with N-Z are to bring hors d'oeuvres. The meeting adjourned at 11:30 a.m.
