

Schools Report from Board Member, Libby Carter

It's Kick-off Week for the Moore County Schools, and the upcoming school year is certainly looking like a good one! Whether you're a teacher, a student, or a retired and involved educator, MCS is certainly ready to get the new year underway.

The new Area I school on Camp Easter Road is right on schedule and will open exactly one year from now in Fall 2019. Overcrowded campuses at Sandhills FarmLife and Vass Lakeview will soon be able to fit all students into their classroom buildings, and modular units will be things of the past. A study of the required redistricting is already underway, and a new principal and redrawn attendance lines should be announced late this fall.

The County Commissioners have authorized the release of the first school construction bonds so construction on the new Aberdeen Elementary School will begin in September. The formal ground-breaking ceremony will officially open the construction

site in mid-October. Early spring will see construction also get underway at the new Southern Pines Elementary School, just off Morganton Road, and the construction timeline has students and staff opening school in Fall 2020 at both these sites. Pinehurst Elementary is currently on the drawing board with an anticipated opening in Fall 2021. Design is also underway for a \$15 million dollar addition at North Moore High School, bringing a new auxiliary gymnasium, weight room, wrestling room, and 13 additional classrooms and science labs. We continue to be grateful for the long-range vision of our County Commissioners as they embrace the need to properly and safely house our students.

Our primary teachers may be interested to hear that MCS has returned "Purposeful Play" to our kindergarten classrooms. This process was removed from our NC kindergartens by the State some years ago, but the local school board listened to requests from our kindergarten teachers and curriculum and instruction teams and have opted to return this highly successful technique to these beginning classrooms. Watch as our youngest students "learn to love learning!"

The Board of Education and Superintendent Grimesey just unveiled a new strategic plan for the schools and will be sharing the new "Engage. Inspire. Succeed." Program during the early fall. This replaces the old "Growing to Greatness" Program used by Drs.

Purser and Spence. I hope to share more on this in a future mailing.

Additionally, STEM programs are expanding into the lowest grades at many of our schools, so students in K-2 classrooms will have the opportunity to see science and math in action. Eighteen more seniors received diplomas at the August graduation at the Community Learning Center, bringing our graduation rate to 81.8%. Early reports from many of our schools suggest that test schools on writing and math show improvement across the county. PBIS programs (Positive Behavior) continue to make a difference in discipline referrals in all schools, and several primary and middle schools will be receiving state recognition for the success of their programs.

The list can go on and on…so many wonderful things are happening in our public schools. Take a moment and look for a way to get involved again on campus; many hands make the work easy. Whether you tutor, paint, or do bulletin boards, help on all levels is appreciated. You might even find your real calling as I did last week—becoming an artist on the door of a bathroom stall. Come back and join us; the doors are now open!

Rising printing and mailing costs and declining DKG membership caused the board to find ways to cut costs.

Five print issues of DKG News a year cost the Society over \$115,000.

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DKG Society International Convention

International *Constitution* and *Standing Rules* Amended at Convention

After much lively discussion for and against changing the name of the Society, the name will remain The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International. Other proposed amendments, however, did pass at the International Convention July 16-20 in Austin. Among the proposed amendments that passed is to change the name of the state organizations to geographic locations and omit the Greek name references. The proposal retained that states shall name the chapters.

Although amendments take effect immediately upon passing at the convention, the name change will be gradual as the International Constitution Committee works through all the changes this month.

Another change is to allow education majors to become collegiate members of DKG.

The new addition to the membership section outlines qualifications and dues.
